Thematic Outline

The cp³ project conducted three-year research on collaborative governance arrangements as innovative approaches in policy to enhance biodiversity and ecosystem services in agricultural landscapes. Thereby, collaborative governance builds upon partnerships of actors from the civil society, public and private sphere of society and is contrasted to hierarchical command and control or market-based governance approaches. The analysis was based on empirical research in three European protection areas: the Biosphere reserve Spreewald, Germany, the Nature park Jauerling-Wachau, Austria, and the Berg en Dal region as part of the National Landscape Gelderse Poort, Netherlands. The workshops will highlight key research results of the project centered around the following research questions:

- What are the specific characteristics of collaborative governance and what are the merits they hold over hierarchical and market-based approaches?
- How can collaborative governance arrangements help to reach a better institutional fit, that is to ensure that the governance structures are spatially and temporally well-aligned to the ecosystems they are meant to govern?
- How can collaborative governance arrangements improve the leeway for farmers to change their management towards more sustainable production practices to spur biodiversity and increase ecosystem service provision at landscape level?

The workshop will start with an introduction by the workshop organizers. Then there will be time for four or five individuals invited presentations, including time for Q&A (time slots of 20-30 min.) The workshop will close with a final discussion. In-between there will be short break.
